I. Call to Order

Where have we seen God at work? Joe F. told of reading an article in the Wall Street Journal today. Doug T. told about being at his oncology appointment when a young lady came to him in the waiting room and told him she was praying for him. III Learning

Approval of Consent Calendar

IV. Leading

Work Team Reports:

Outreach: JoAnn Testerman reported she had sent out an email about dispersing the Spare Change money to other Outreach committee members but had not received any replies. There was some discussion from Leadership of any projects in our community that we might use this money to help with. The city swimming pool was mentioned. It was discussed that maybe a project might be done to even multiply our money to help with the pool project. JoAnn will do some checking into this.

Worship: Our church will be hosting VBS this year on June 17-20. Beth Palmer is the coordinator for this.

Sub-Committee Reports:

Finance:

The Treasurer's report was prepared by treasurer, Sara Gates. The report was emailed out to the Leadership Team. Hard copies were handed out at the meeting also. The March report showed revenues of \$11,494.26 and expenses at \$13,525.78 for a general fund difference of (\$2,031.52). YTD general fund difference of (\$10,743.44).

Trustees:

Hughes Electric said they will get the wiring for the back TV done soon. We have asked them to have it done before VBS in June.

Parsonage Carpeting – Dwight Gutzmer has come to measure and given quotes for replacing living room, 3 bedrooms, office, hallway and basement stairway.

There was discussion of doing all or some of the carpeting areas and also discussion of funding for this and possible fundraising to cover the cost.

JoAnn T. was asked to contact JoAnn Morford about taking money from the Franklin Capital Outlay fund and if there was any penalty with do so. Also, JoAnn T. will contact Quoin bank and inquire about the CD and penalty for taking that out early. When that information is received, an email would be sent out to all members with costs of carpet and options of funding listed. Members will be asked to review all of that and email their vote in a reply as to yes or no with all or some of carpet done, in favor of a fundraiser and where to get funding to cover the cost of the carpet if fundraiser doesn't cover it.

Staff-Parish Relations: No report

Church member requests classroom use for book study.

Melanie Bower has asked to use a classroom for a (1 x/week) 6-week group book study. It was the general consensus that she would be allowed to do this.

d. Report from Highmore-Harrold meetings.

Joe Fiala, Sara Gates and JoAnn Testerman are part of the committee with Highmore and Harrold. Joe reported that the meetings are going well. The group last met on April 13 with DS Dan Bader. He gave out copies of a covenant that another partnering parish is using to help with some guidance. He also explained about some grants will be available to help with technology cost and ministry in rural areas. He also introduced us to Allison Galbreath. The group were very impressed with her and all agreed in favor of her becoming the new pastor.

e Pastor's Report-

Pastor Teresa reported that United Methodist General Conference will meet April 23-May 3, 2024 in Charlotte, NC. There will be over 1,000 pieces of legislation to go over. Ongoing reports will be available to see on the UMC church web sites and Facebook pages.

Our Dakotas Annual Conference will be in Bismarck on June 6-9. We are allotted 2 delegates.

There was no more business brought before the group.

Adjournment: Gene Moncur made a motion that the meeting be adjourned, Doug Testerman made a second to the motion. All voted in favor. The meeting was adjourned with The Lord's Prayer at 6:10 p.m.

Addendum to the minutes:

Members emailed in their votes on April 18 and 19. as to carpeting all or some of the parsonage, doing a fundraiser or not and where to get the funds to offset the cost if the fundraiser did not cover the cost of the carpet.

The majority vote was to do all of the parsonage carpeting, having a fundraiser to pay for it and to get additional funds from the Franklin Capital Outlay Fund if needed. The electronic votes are saved in the Office Manager's computer.

The trustees will contact Dwight Gutzmer to tell him we will move forward with the parsonage carpeting.

Liturgical scholar Balthasar Fischer (1912-2001) shared an "a-ha" realization about the significance of praying with open, outstretched hands, an ancient practice. The opposite gesture, a closed fist, is used to threaten others or even inflict violence. We also grasp things in closed fists, refusing to let go, to share, to hold gently or loosely.



When we pray with open hands, Fischer explained, we're saying before God that we renounce "all highhandedness, all pride in [our] own sufficiency, all violence." We hold up our empty hands to God, saying, "I have nothing that I have not received from you, nothing that you have not placed in my empty hands. Therefore I do not keep a frantic hold on anything you have given me; therefore, too, I desire not to strike and hurt but only to give and to spread happiness and joy."
